Lesson Plan Goals & Objectives (Specify skills/information that will be learned.)	Students will identify why ethics is important. Students will examine ways to be ethical on the job. Students will explore workplace ethics.
Materials Needed	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Paper • Pencil • Computer with internet • workplace ethics issue sheet
Introduction of Subject Anticipatory set (Give and/or demonstrate necessary information)	Work as a group to define workplace ethics.

Activity 1 (Describe the independent activity to reinforce this lesson)	Divide students into 5 groups and have groups each research a workplace ethics issue . What are the ethic questions in the situation and how would you handle it?
Activity 2 (Describe the independent activity to reinforce this lesson)	Have students present their issues to the class and discuss.
Activity 3 (Describe the independent activity to reinforce this lesson)	Homework-Compile and bring to the next class a written list of five business situations in which people must make ethical decisions. The examples can be taken from home, school, work, TV shows or movies. For each situation, state: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) What ethical question was raised? 2) Do you think the answer was easy or difficult? 3) How was the question resolved? 4) How would you have resolved it?"
Assessment	Class discussion Student research Student presentations Homework
Summary/Evaluation (Assign Homework, or Reflect on the Outcomes)	Answer the following question in ½-1 page: When you accept a job, what does the employer owe you, and what do you owe the employer?
