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# MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS (MD\&A) OF 2023 MEMBERSHIP RESULTS 

## BACKGROUND

Family, Career and Community Leaders of America, Inc. (FCCLA) was founded in 1945 as the Future Homemakers of America (FHA) with the purpose to stimulate and promote the best interests of pupils of homemaking education, through programs involving matters of personal growth, family life, vocational preparation, and community involvement. In 1999, FHA was renamed to become Family, Career and Community Leaders of America, Inc. (FCCLA) with a renewed focus to prepare today's youth for careers through Family and Consumer Sciences education. FCCLA is governed by volunteer leadership elected by related organizations and groups, ex officio, youth members, and other business and industry leaders elected by the Board of Directors. In conjunction with National Staff and the National Executive Council (NEC), a strategic plan is created to guide the organization. FCCLA is operating in year one of a three-year strategic plan that will take FCCLA through fiscal year 2025.

In response to challenges brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic, in September 2020, the Board approved two temporary membership packages. For the 2021-22 and 2022-23 affiliation years, the Board approved continuing the two temporary membership packages, with a few changes. The Up to 20 Leadership Development package was changed to the Up to 25 Chapter Package, and the FCS Unlimited Development Package was rebranded as the Unlimited Membership Package. Both packages included chapter benefits, such as one (1) Adviser Academy registration, one (1) National Program (electronic version), and one (1) Lifetime Alumni \& Associates membership.

In July 2018, the Board approved a pilot program for 100\% Middle-Level Affiliation, for the affiliation year commencing August 1, 2018. The purpose of this pilot program is to introduce and engage students during middle school and encourage them to continue their journey with FCCLA throughout their high school careers. Under this program, a chapter defined as Middle-Level (a chapter whose membership is composed of ninth grade or lower) can affiliate its entire class for a flat chapter rate rather than an individual membership rate. States can opt into this program, and chapters within that state can affiliate under this program or continue to affiliate under the regular individual rate.

In 1993, as part of the strategic plan, FCCLA undertook an initiative to increase membership in urban communities throughout the United States. This pilot program has changed over the years. Urban affiliation currently allows a local education agency (LEA) with a city within its jurisdiction with a core population of 100,000 or more, to enroll all of their students, who are currently or previously enrolled in a Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) education class, for a flat rate.

For the year ended May 31, 2023, FCCLA had 236,529 members in 5,163 chapters across 45 states, American Samoa, and Puerto Rico.

For the third straight year, FCCLA saw an increase in affiliated chapters. 2022-23 total chapters represent 99\% of the Pre-COVID-19 level.

In 2023, FCCLA saw 195 more chapters participating in one of the two temporary membership packages compared to the 2022 affiliation year, making up $14 \%$ of total chapters. The temporary membership packages make up the second and third most popular chapter membership types, after regular, which consists of 4,150 chapters, or $80 \%$ of total chapters.

Chapters - By Chapter Membership Type


In 2023, FCCLA saw an increase in membership of 38,647 members. This increase was driven by an increase in the two fixed-rate chapter membership types; Unlimited Membership Package and $100 \%$ Middle-Level Affiliation. These two fixed-rate chapter membership types increased by 16,589 and 12,085 members, respectively. Chapters that were affiliated under the Unlimited Membership Package during the 2023 affiliation year saw an average increase of 150 members per chapter as compared to 2019-20.

Membership - By Chapter Membership Type


Chapters that affiliated under the Regular Chapter membership type, on average, increased membership by 2 members per chapter. Members affiliating under the Regular Chapter Membership Type make up 43\% of the total membership, down 5\% compared to the prior year.

For the affiliation year ending May 31, 2023, FCCLA also saw an increase in membership retention of 81,056 members, representing $51 \%$ retention of eligible members. Eligible members include non-12th graders and post-secondary members affiliated in the 2021-22 membership year. This retention increase was supported by 29,227 members classified under the Regular chapter membership type ( $31 \%$ ), followed by 25,499 under the Unlimited Membership Package ( $57 \%$ ), 12,124 under the Pilot $100 \%$ Middle-Level Program ( $41 \%$ ), and 10,703 under Urban Affiliation (50\%). FCCLA also saw 1,188 members return to FCCLA after not affiliating in the 202122 affiliation year.

FCCLA saw the male population grow to 72,933 members, an increase of 14,822 members compared to the prior year. The male population represents $31 \%$ of the overall membership population. Additionally, during the 2021-22 affiliation year, FCCLA began tracking non-binary members. FCCLA saw the non-binary population grow to 2,055 members, representing $0.87 \%$ of the overall membership population. This is an increase of 395 members when compared to the 2021-22 affiliation year.

The affiliation year ending May 31, 2023, FCCLA continued to see increased diversity among members. For the fifth year in a row, FCCLA saw a decrease in Caucasian membership to $47.13 \%$. This represents the third time since FCCLA reported on demographics that Caucasian membership made up less than $50 \%$ of the total membership. Hispanic membership remained around $23 \%$, followed by African American (12.57\%), Asian (2.72\%), Native American (1.81\%), Pacific Islander (.23\%), and Other (10.77\%). FCCLA continues to work towards creating an inclusive environment that welcomes and values all youth.


## CONCLUSION

FCCLA had a strong year, with membership reaching a nine-year high, while gaining 250 chapters compared to 2021-2022. FCCLA still trails pre-pandemic chapter levels and the ten-year high by 71 and 296 chapters, respectively. Due to the continued success of the two membership packages, FCCLA will have the membership vote at the 2023 National Leadership Conference on making the four (4) membership options permanent. FCCLA envisions continuing to build on the success of membership and looks forward to introducing more youth into the world of Family and Consumer Sciences.
